


## Nunavut Water Board Mandate

- The Nunavut Water Board (NWB) is an institution of public government established under the Nunavut Agreement.
- The NWB has responsibilities and powers over the regulation, use and management of freshwater in Nunavut.
- Authority: Nunavut Agreement, Nunavut Waters and Nunavut Surface Rights Tribunal Act and Nunavut Waters Regulations.
- The primary objects of the Board are to provide for the conservation and utilization of water in Nunavut in a manner that will provide optimum benefit from those waters for the residents of Nunavut and Canadians in general.
- The Board's primary regulatory functions involve the approval of the use of water or deposit of waste (without a licence for limited uses/deposits) or by issuing Type "A" or "B" licences.

## Nunavut Water Management Strategy (NWMS)

- Nunavut is currently the only jurisdiction in Canada that does not have a comprehensive territorial freshwater management approach.
- The Nunavut Agreement sets out the Nunavut Water Board's Mandate to include territorial management of freshwater
- The NWMS will strengthen the coordinated management approach to ensure freshwater in Nunavut is conserved and used in a manner that provides the optimum benefit for all Nunavummiut in particular, and all Canadians in general





## NWMS Key Drivers

- Aligning Legislation and Policy under one umbrella
- Enshrining freshwater Co-Management
   Approaches to address changing roles under Devolution
- Strengthen **Regulatory Clarity** for water users and developers
- Guide freshwater management in a context of Territorial Growth, Cumulative Effects, and Climate Change
- Grounding freshwater management in principles of Inuit Qaujimajatuqangit
- Communicating the **Roles of Nunavummiut** in freshwater management
- Planning for the Future







# NWMS Steering Committee

- A NWMS Steering Committee (Steering Committee) was established in 2019, and includes participation from:
  - Nunavut Water Board (NWB) lead organization
  - Government of Nunavut (GN)
  - Nunavut Tunngavik Incorporated (NTI)
  - Regional Inuit Associations (RIAs)
  - Crown Indigenous Relations and Northern Affairs
     Canada (CIRNAC)
  - Nunavut Planning Commission (NPC)
- Purpose: bring Nunavut's Institutions of Public Government, Inuit Authorities, federal and territorial governments, communities and other nongovernmental organizations together to address the challenge of developing an integrated freshwater management strategy for the territory



## NWMS Next Steps

- Initiate / Plan Engagement
  - Meeting with the Regional Inuit Associations to initiate planning for engagement
  - Building awareness of water management and the need for the NWMS in communities
  - Liaison with communities regarding regional workshops, provision of background materials, selection of attendees through the Regional Inuit Organizations
  - Pursue "pre-engagement" through digital media, communications
- In-Person Engagement and Incorporation of Engagement Results
  - Regional workshops (x2 in Qikiqtani, x1 in Kivalliq, x1 in Kitikmeot) currently included in engagement plan, but the exact format, focus and approach will be refined in collaboration with the Regional Inuit Associations and the NWMS Steering Committee
